Welcome to Glynmarch Farm Camping



General Information

As much as we don't like rules, there are a few necessary ones to make everyone's stay as pleasant as possible. The most important rule of all is to avoid upsetting anyone else.

One of the great things about Glynmarch is the peace and quiet. In order to keep the campsite as relaxing as we can please keep noise to a reasonable level in the evenings, and we kindly ask that the campsite is quiet after 10 PM.

If walking to and from the village, please do respect our neighbours' need for peace and quiet when passing their houses, especially in the evenings.

Please put any litter in the bins provided in the campsite field. Recycling does not include foil, clingfilm or glass (separate bin for glass), and please ideally rinse tins etc. Foil and cling film should be put in with General Rubbish.

<u>Pitching</u> Please ensure tents are no closer than 6M from any neighbouring campers. This is for fire safety.

<u>Kite Flying</u> Please note that because of the power lines we do not allow kite flying in the camping field. Kites can be flown on other parts of the farm.

<u>Cleaning</u> We will thoroughly clean toilets and showers up to three times a day in busy periods. Alcohol hand sanitizer is provided in the toilet facilities and should be used regularly. Please note that alcohol sanitizer is flammable until it has completely evaporated.

<u>Showers</u> The showers are heated. Simply turn the red handle fully through 90 degrees and the water will come out warm (generally between 34 and 38 C) after about 40 seconds.

<u>Fires</u> Fire wood is available to buy at a cost of £6.00 for a bag. There is a small amount of dead fallen wood that can be collected from around the farm, but please stay off the accumulated branches and trees in the river. These accumulate during the winter high water and can be dangerous to climb on. If lighting fires on the farm, please use existing fire areas marked by circles of stones on the ground. Please do not light fires in the camping field unless raised off the grass sufficiently to avoid scorching. Barbeques are fine if raised up off the grass. Burnt charcoal can be disposed of in the metal bucket next to the washing up area. Please do note that in exceptionally dry weather we may need to ban fires and Barbeques for reasons of safety.

Access Most areas of the farm are available to explore except where roped off (see map below). This is mostly for your safety so please do not enter any of the roped off areas marked grey on the map. Exploring the farm is at your own risk; we do everything we can to make it as safe as possible, but there are always hazards to be wary of. We are surrounded by other farm land, most of which has animals on so please stay out of the neighbouring fields beyond the boundaries on the map.

<u>The River Marlais</u> You can cross over the river as shown on the map when it's low enough, which is usually during most of the summer months but you might need wellies or bare feet. What we call the 'island' has some nice places to sit by the river and also have a fire if you wish.

A few parts of the river are quite deep; please be very careful if paddling in it and please avoid the areas of river bed marked in grey on the map which have underlying very soft clay, despite the solid appearance of the covering rocks.
